Your High School Options

- Most Arlington families send their children to the neighborhood school designated by the specific attendance/boundary zone in which they live. (See School Locations and Boundaries Map on page 12, call 703-228-7660 or go to the APS Web site, www.apsva.us, to determine your child's neighborhood school.)
- To determine the choices available to your high school-age child in 2009-10, refer to the chart below. All students in the county are eligible to apply to the H-B Woodlawn Secondary Program. It does not have a specified attendance/boundary zone, and it has a separate admission policy and process. The International Baccalaureate Program (IB) at Washington-Lee and the Advanced Placement (AP) Network at Wakefield are also available countywide through the transfer application process. The

Spanish Immersion Program at Wakefield is open to eligible students through the course selection process. Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology (Fairfax) is available to students who meet admission requirements and submit the school's application. School bus transportation is provided to students who are enrolled in any of the above-listed programs.

- High schools are permitted to accept transfer students on a space-available basis provided that the number of transfers does not go beyond five (5) percent of the school's enrollment or cause the school to exceed capacity. Transfer Process and Orientation Schedule for the 2009-10 School Year

The time period to apply for a transfer to another school or to apply to a countywide school or program for the 2009-10 school year is Mon, Nov. 3, 2008 through Fri, Jan. 16, 2009.

- The transfer orientations are required for parents or guardians who are considering a transfer to a high school other than their neighborhood school or for those who are considering applying to a countywide program. They are not intended for parents or guardians new to Arlington or those who plan to attend their neighborhood school.
- All the high schools schedule formal orientations to enable parents or guardians to visit the schools, meet the principals, see the schools "in action" and get a general sense of the personalities of each of the schools.
- The Pupil Transfer Application form must be signed by the principal of the neighborhood school and must be turned in to the school to which the parent is requesting a transfer.

Wakefield High School is a richly diverse school where many ethnic groups and cultures are represented. Students have the benefit of learning with peers from around the world

on a daily basis. This multicultural aspect is just one of the unique features of **Wakefield**. **Wakefield** was a 2006 recipient of one of three National College Board Inspiration Awards of \$25,000. This prestigious award was given in recognition and support of **Wakefield's** commitment to challenge all students to take advanced and Advanced Placement courses.

Wakefield takes great pride in its ninth grade "House" program, called the FOUNDATION FOR ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE as well as its Senior Project requirement of an independently conducted project presented for assessment by a review panel. Also unique are the COHORT program designed to increase the enrollment of African-American and Hispanic males in Advanced Placement courses, and the United Minority Girls group, designed to assist juniors and seniors with the college application process. The exemplary project, the Advanced Placement Network, whose goal is to provide access to Advanced Placement courses for all students, continues to grow and expand.

Technology is a focus for all students beginning with a required 9th grade course and expanding to higher level classes including Network Administration, JAVA and Cisco. **Wakefield** provides its students and teachers with nine full-sized computer labs and every classroom has at least one computer station with full-class display capability, allowing teachers to provide instruction using the most up-to-date software and Internet resources. **Wakefield** boasts a state-of-the-art Technology Center complete with a television production studio. Each spring, **Wakefield** has a Technology Expo where students present examples of technology-based schoolwork.

There are many leadership opportunities for **Wakefield** students. All Virginia High School League sports are offered and all athletes are required to maintain a 2.0 GPA. The Drama program maintains a strong partnership with Signature Theatre and fine arts students compete in and win many competitions. **Wakefield's** commitment is to continue providing programs of excellence for all of its students.

Washington-Lee, the first of the three comprehensive high schools in Arlington, is now in its 85th year of operation. The school boasts a diverse student population representing more than 50 countries from across the globe.

Washington-Lee has international exchange opportunities with Rheims, France.

Washington-Lee is proud of its history and traditions, which include honors by the U.S. Department of Education, the Virginia Board of Education, the Virginia Department of Education, *The Washington Post* and *Newsweek* magazine.

The International Baccalaureate Diploma was first offered at **Washington-Lee** in 1998, when the first cohort of thirteen students graduated. Since that time, over 260 students have earned the prestigious IB Diploma, in conjunction with the State of Virginia Advanced Studies Diploma.

Washington-Lee graduates in 2008 earned more than \$4.0 million in scholarship awards. Ninety-three percent of its graduates go directly on to post-secondary education, with more than eighty-one percent enrolling in four-year colleges and universities.

Washington-Lee and the Arlington Career Center are providing an opportunity for seniors to pursue a career interest during the final three weeks of the senior year. This project, *Exploring Work from Theory to Practice*, is now in its fourth year. It is open to any senior who has a 2.5 grade point average or higher as well as the recommendation of senior year instructors. Students read selections from texts that deal with the theory and practice of work. These readings provide a foundation for seminar discussions and subsequent workplace experiences. Students record their thoughts and observations in journals and share with students, parents, instructors and mentors during a final seminar at the end of the school year.

Washington-Lee offers an extensive selection of Advanced Placement (AP) courses which require students to complete an exit exam that may lead to college credit. Students may begin AP classes as early as the sophomore year with AP European History or AP Government for sophomores, which is the gateway course for students interested in the IB Diploma program.

Students entering **Washington-Lee** in the ninth grade are automatically enrolled in the *Freshman Connection*, a transition program designed to ease the process of entering high school from middle school. Students are divided into clusters with four subject area teachers assigned to each group who meet regularly with each other to provide support for students as they adjust to the rigors of academic and social life at the high school level. Two guidance counselors are assigned to the freshman class as well as a designated assistant principal.

The students at **Yorktown High School** reflect Arlington's rich diversity. **Yorktown's** primary goal is to provide all students a first-rate academic education, while fostering the development of the

social and emotional skills for success in life. The faculty and community commitments to this primary goal make **Yorktown** a challenging and unique secondary school.

Over ninety percent of **Yorktown** graduates pursue post-secondary education; others go on to the military or join the work force after graduation. A recent *Washington Post* ranking of high schools placed **Yorktown** in the top ten most academically challenging high schools in the Washington metropolitan area. *Newsweek* included Yorktown in its listing of the top 50 high schools in the nation. Recently, **Yorktown's** Activities Program received the Wachovia Sportsmanship, Ethics & Integrity Award. In 2004, **Yorktown** was designated one of ten "National Schools of Character" by the National Character Education Partnership.

With an emphasis on high expectations for every student, **Yorktown** addresses the needs of its students through a broad curriculum, a large number of special programs, and the support of a wide range of professionals and community members. Several computer labs and mini-labs throughout the building, a **Yorktown** television studio and teacher technology productivity centers allow students and faculty opportunities to utilize technology for learning and instruction.

In 2004, **Yorktown** established a "Center for Leadership and Public Service" to coordinate its varied student programs in leadership, service and social-emotional learning. Students also enrich their education with electives in foreign languages and fine arts. The high level of student involvement in these programs, and the recognition students regularly receive for their accomplishments in these areas, is a tribute to the student talent and dedication that are hallmarks of **Yorktown**.

Student choice is the central focus of **H-B Woodlawn's** alternative secondary program. The school's program does not provide for "continuous adult supervision." Rather, students must decide how to use their time wisely to

meet their obligations. The amount of "unsupervised" time increases gradually from 6th - 12th grade. To make this offer of freedom work, **H-B Woodlawn** trusts the good intentions of its students and they must reciprocate with a sufficient degree of personal responsibility.

The student who can best take advantage of the personal freedom at **H-B Woodlawn** is self-motivated and self-directed. Students are empowered to have control over their educational program. Accordingly, they are responsible for their actions. In 1971, the school selected "a word to the wise is sufficient" as its school motto to reflect its association of freedom with responsibility.

The "Town Meeting" is **H-B Woodlawn's** policy-making body. Each student, teacher and parent in attendance has an equal vote. As students are treated equally with adults in Town Meeting voting, so are they in relations with adults. Experience has been that **H-B Woodlawn** students approach college with a mature and realistic understanding of their interests and abilities and with a heightened commitment to learning for its inherent value.

The **Career Center** is an integral part of the program of studies conducted at each of Arlington's high schools. **Career Center** courses supplement and enrich the Arlington Public Schools' existing educational programs. The wide variety of curriculum offerings support the state standard and advanced studies diplomas. Both the skills and academic programs prepare students to continue their formal education or directly enter the labor market after high school. Approximately sixty percent of **Career Center** graduates continue their education at colleges, universities, trade schools and technical institutes.

Through articulation agreements with Northern Virginia Community College, several programs offer college credit for classes taken at the **Career Center** while students are still in high school. Some programs also offer state and/or local certification

for students who successfully complete **Career Center** classes. Many students take part in a wide variety of field experiences through internships, apprentice, mentor and work-study programs.

Students generally take a school bus from their neighborhood school to the **Career Center**. Students enrolled only in skills or fundamentals classes return to their high school for the remainder of the school day to take academic classes, have lunch and participate in extracurricular and co-curricular activities.

Some students may elect to take all or part of their academic classes at the **Career Center**. Through a variety of academic options, students will learn English, mathematics, social studies and science in a way that relates and applies the subject matter to their elected vocational/technical classes. Students may schedule vocational/technical and academic courses through their home high school guidance counselors.

Thomas Jefferson High School for Science and Technology (TJHSST)

is a Fairfax County public school designated by the Virginia Department of Education as a Governor's Regional School. It offers a comprehensive college preparatory program emphasizing the sciences, mathematics and technology. Any APS student presently enrolled in grade eight and enrolled in Algebra I (or a higher level math course) may apply. If selected, students attend TJHSST tuition free, as all tuition fees are paid by APS.

Applications were distributed after Sept. 22, 2008 by the TJHSST liaison counselor at each APS middle school who will collect them by the Oct. 24, 2008 deadline. The processing fee of \$90 (\$25 for students who qualify for free or reduced-price meals) must accompany the application. Waivers are available for students with severe financial need.

All applicants must take the Thomas Jefferson Admission Test, which will be administered on Sat, Dec. 6, 2008.

Transportation is provided to Arlington students selected for admission.

Since its inception in 1929, the High School Continuation Program (HSCP) has offered students an alternative way to earn a high school diploma. Although students are responsible for the same course requirements, numbers of credits, and SOL assessment verification as students in the comprehensive high schools, the program offers flexibility in the way and timeframe in which students can earn a high school diploma. Important information includes:

- Students are able to earn six or seven credits in a year.
- The program is divided into two semesters, and students may take one, two, or three two-hour classes each semester.
- The financial cost to students vary with age.
- Students may refer themselves to the program; the comprehensive high school may refer students; the courts may refer students.
- Students must be at least 16 years of age to enter the HSCP; there is no upper age limit.

As a result of working in a program that is kept small by design, teachers have developed a family-type supportive atmosphere. They have also developed the skills to teach extremely diverse students more than one subject in any given classroom setting, an ability necessary to a small program.

The **New Directions** program provides identified students with academic, counseling, and vocational opportunities in a small and nurturing environment. Its highly structured, controlled, and supportive academic setting offers students the possibility of earning the high school credits needed for graduation. The

characteristics listed below apply to students currently enrolled in **New Directions**.

- The student is at least 14 years of age and has reached at least grade nine in school.
- The student is on probation and has a probation officer.
- The student has experienced difficulty in the school and/or in the community.
- The student needs a strictly-controlled environment.
- The student is recommended by his/her home school and is accepted by a screening committee of Arlington Public Schools staff members.

New Directions has three main goals: improve academic status, build positive character and successfully complete probation obligations. Students are expected to make progress toward academic goals, and families are encouraged to meet with staff to develop programs to reinforce schoolwork at home. Students successfully complete the **New Directions** program through one of several paths: (a) completing the APS graduation requirements and graduate from high school; (b) returning to their home high school; or (c) transferring to the High School Continuation Program at Langston or at Arlington Mill.

Stratford Program (Special Education, Grades 6-12)

The **Stratford Program** provides education for secondary-aged students ages 10 to 22 who require extensive program applications. As a program serving students with specialized educational needs, **Stratford** utilizes both classroom and community resources. As part of Arlington's commitment for a continuum of services, the program provides instruction to assist students with adult placement in the community. Parents and community agencies are an integral part of the planning and services.

Stratford Program students work in the community and frequently transition to work sites. Transition plans start at age 16 but actual case management with adult services starts just prior to age 18.

Preparation for adult community living is the primary goal of the **Stratford Program**. In order to achieve this goal, a wide range of programs are developed to address each student's needs. Areas of instruction are based on vocational skills, community skills, academics, communication, leisure, recreation and other independent skills.

Arlington Public Schools is committed to addressing the needs of pregnant and parenting teens through its **Teenage Parenting Programs (TPP)**. The mission of TPP is to provide leadership for collaborative, comprehensive services in Arlington County to address the issues of adolescent pregnancy including educational needs, pregnancy prevention, teenage parenting, and healthy families. The **Teenage Parenting Programs** consist of the following three programs:

- Family Education Center
- Outreach for Parenting Teens
- Alternatives for Parenting Teens

Throughout pregnancy and the early stages of parenthood, pregnant and parenting teens are able to attend the Family Education Center (FEC) and remain there for the remainder of the school year. At the FEC, students continue their academic studies, are assisted in obtaining prenatal and childcare services, and learn parenting skills.

The Outreach for Parenting Teens (OPT) program locates out-of-school pregnant and parenting teens and facilitates their return to school or vocational training.

The Alternatives for Parenting Teens (APT) program, a collaborative program of APS and the Arlington Department of Human Services, serves young mothers and their children. While young mothers continue their academic studies, learn child development and parenting skills, and have access to comprehensive health services, their children are nurtured in the licensed APT Infant Care Center.



Registering Your Student for High School

CURRENT ARLINGTON STUDENTS

Selection of Courses.

In January the 2009-10 *High School Program of Studies* will be available at the middle and high schools and on the “Instruction” section of the APS Web site, www.apsva.us. It includes general and specific information about curricular offerings and services at the high schools, the Career Center and alternative programs. The Program of Studies is designed to facilitate parent and student planning of a comprehensive program that will meet both graduation and personal requirements.

In preparation for the move to high school, the high school counselors visit the middle schools to meet with eighth graders during late January and early February. Following this academic planning session, each student updates the 4-6 Year Academic Plan and makes course selections for the next year. Once the student’s Course Request Form (CRF) is completed, it is sent home for parent approval and is then forwarded to the high school. Parent conferences are available upon request. Participation in Sports

To participate in sports during the fall of the school year, the student is required to have a valid Virginia High School League (VHSL) physical examination form completed and dated after May 1. Forms are available at the schools or on their Web sites and at the “Registration” section of the APS Web site, www.apsva.us.

Recommended Immunizations

Beginning in Sept. 2009, the human papillomavirus HPV vaccination will be required for rising sixth-grade girls. The Virginia code allows parents or guardians to choose not to have their child vaccinated after having reviewed materials describing the link between the human papillomavirus and cervical cancer. This vaccine is also recommended for older adolescent girls.

The Center for Disease Control recommends a meningococcal (meningitis) vaccination for all 11- to 18-year-olds. The vaccine is required for entry into most colleges. For more information check with your child’s doctor or go to the Arlington County Public Health Web site, www.arlingtonva.us, choose “Immunizations” under “Services.”

NEW STUDENTS

If your child speaks a language other than English as his/her first language, or has been attending an educational system abroad, register your child by contacting the Intake Center at 703-228-7663. In all other cases, register at your neighborhood high school, or at the school where your child has been admitted.

Documentation Needed to Register Your Child

- Proof of the child’s age and legal name, usually a birth certificate
- Proof that the parent or legal guardian of the student lives in Arlington County
- Social Security Number, if available

- Official school records from another school system or country, if applicable and available
- Medical information that includes immunization records and a screening for tuberculosis

Health Requirements

1. **The student’s medical information (immunizations, and physical exam, if available) must be submitted to the school.** A physical examination is recommended, but not required, for high school students.
2. **A screening for tuberculosis within the 12 months before entering school is required.** The original written results must be submitted to the student’s school.
3. **The *Request for Entrance and Health Information* form must be completed and submitted to the student’s school.**

Tips for Parents of High School Students

Next year will bring your student the exciting and new challenges of high school. Indeed, the next four school years will prove to be a time of academic growth and exploration and expanding independence. Begin to plan now how you will support your student during high school. Some helpful tips for your involvement include:

- **Get involved** in the school and your student’s extracurricular activities.
- **Make sure** that your student has a system for keeping track of school assignments and responsibilities and sets a regular schedule for completing homework.
- **Show interest** in your student’s studies. Frequently ask about homework and projects. Make sure all is getting done and is understood.
- **Read and review** with your student the information provided by the school or the school district. Attend Back-to-School Night to learn what is required of your student.
- **Keep in contact** with your student’s counselor and teachers.
- **Make sure** your student attends school on a regular basis.
- **Encourage** your student to pursue new interests and get involved in sports, clubs and tutoring programs, if needed.
- **Know** your student’s friends and know where he/she is at all times.
- **Frequently remind** your student that you are available to help or to listen, and be there when needed.
- **Encourage** your student to get to know his/her counselor.
- **Attend** parent meetings at school and explore how you can volunteer at the school.
- **Consistently acknowledge and reward** your student’s efforts at school.

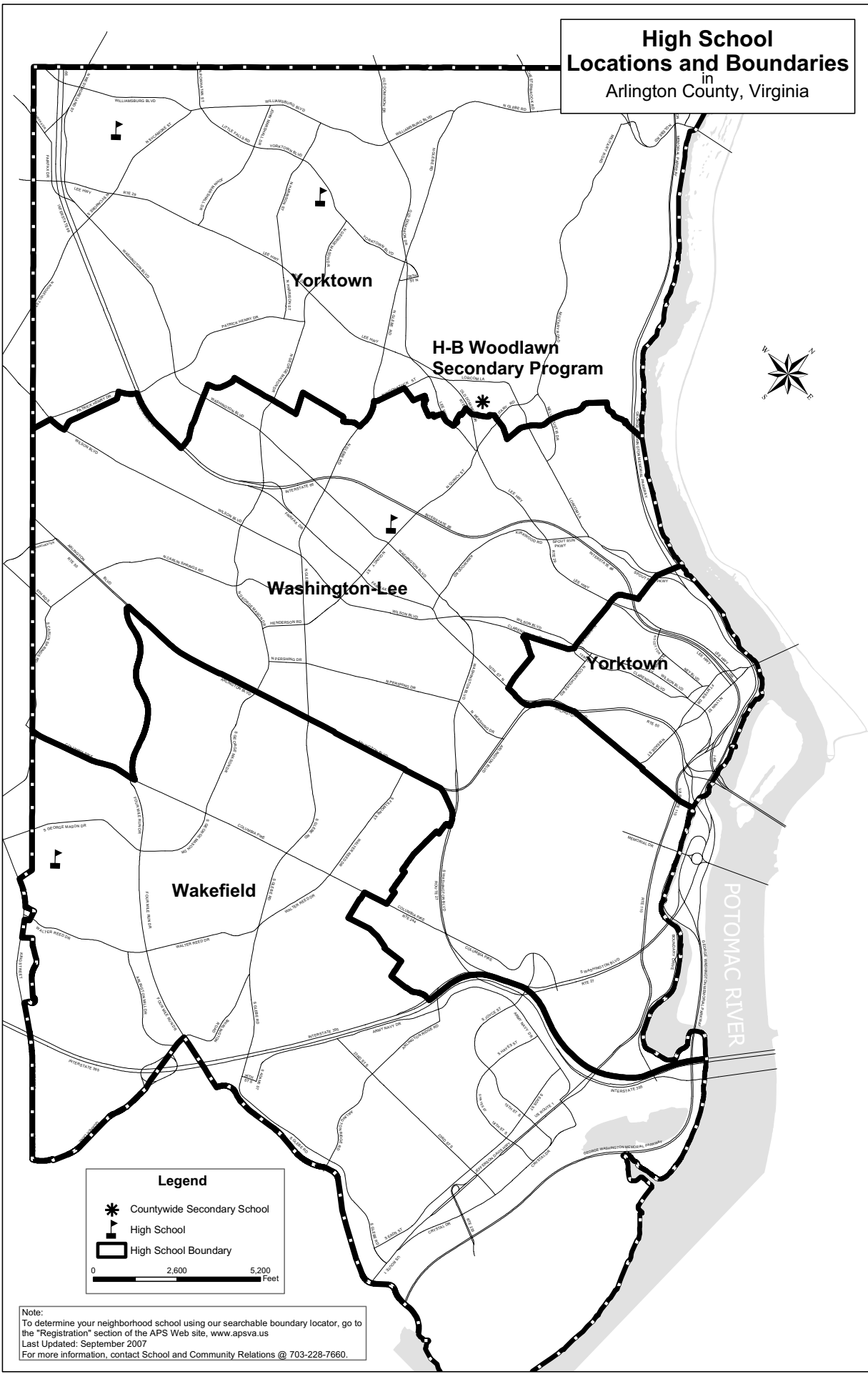
