You don't have to see it directly from the Pike to know it's there, go to it, value it, and be proud of it. Much of this will be fostered through the programming and services rather than a physical facade on half a block of Col Pike. It's more important to design the site well and to spend the resources on constructing a campus that provides outstanding, sought-after programming than it is to spend extra money on the highest environmental certifications to put another feather in the APS cap of pride.

Adhering to LEED standards is admirable, exceeding them, in many cases, may not be cost-effective. We should comply with ADA standards and aim to exceed them, when needed, to truly accommodate those with differing physical abilities. Regarding parking and transportation, walking, biking, and public busing should be encouraged, but underground/structured parking should still be built to accommodate the LARGE number of students, staff, and after-hours community members (from all over Arlington) who will require access to the site. "Creative" or "shared" parking solutions will NOT be sufficient for the load at this site. The shape/structure of the school buildings does not need to be fancy -- it's better and faster to choose "flat" -- but the buildings should look attractive and feel "open" and flooded with light...the OPPOSITE of the current Career Center! Any buildings/structures should have roof space that is actively usable -- whether for recreation, playing fields, dining, lounging, or studying. Any redevelopment of this site should improve/enhance its multi-use connection to all of Arlington, and therefore a physical presence on Columbia Pike and/or a 9th St plaza should be pursued if at all possible.
