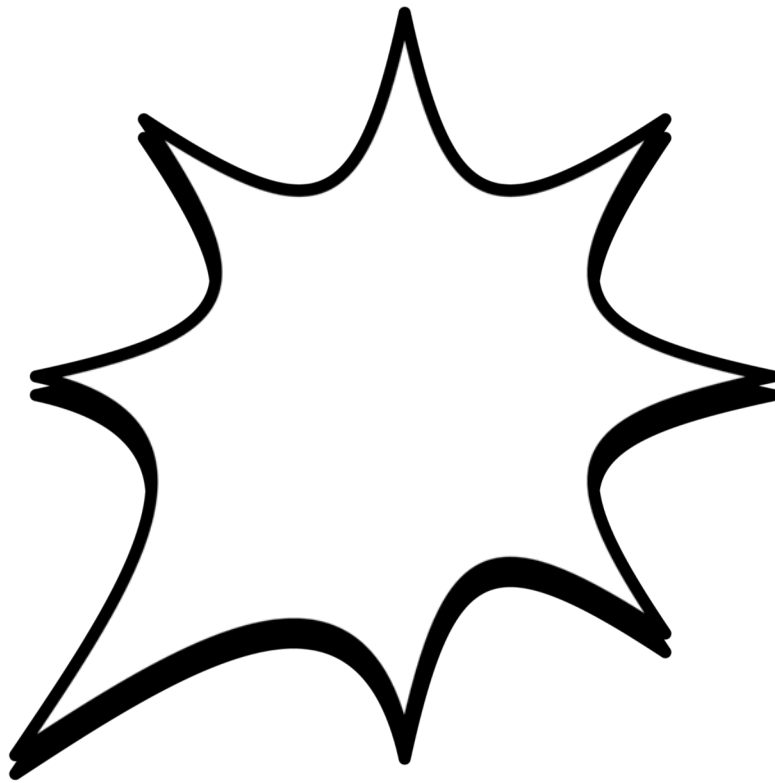

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Speech/language pathologists can review this skill with their students using the included teaching visual. Encourage students to engage in discussion while presenting the visual. The key is to model this skill and provide opportunities for practice using a variety of activities. Here are some activity suggestions:

1. Photo Cards

Use the included photo cards for structured practice. Look at the corresponding picture and read the statements out loud. Use the clues in the photo to decide if the statement is sarcastic or not.

Use the visual on page 4 to scaffold this skill.

Extension Activity: Let the group members take turns saying the statement using the appropriate prosody and body language. Think of unique situations when the statement would (or would not be) sarcastic.

2. Books/YouTube Videos

Activity 1 can also be replicated using scenes in books and YouTube videos.

- Any of the book units in the membership can be used to target this skill.
- What clues can we use to decide if the characters are being sarcastic?

3. Role Play *

Once students are able to describe what they see in others, we can jump into some role play activities! Identify specific situations that they encounter on a daily basis (per observation, parent/teacher report). When are peers most likely to be sarcastic? How can the student respond?

** Video modeling is a great (evidence-based) strategy to use with this activity!*

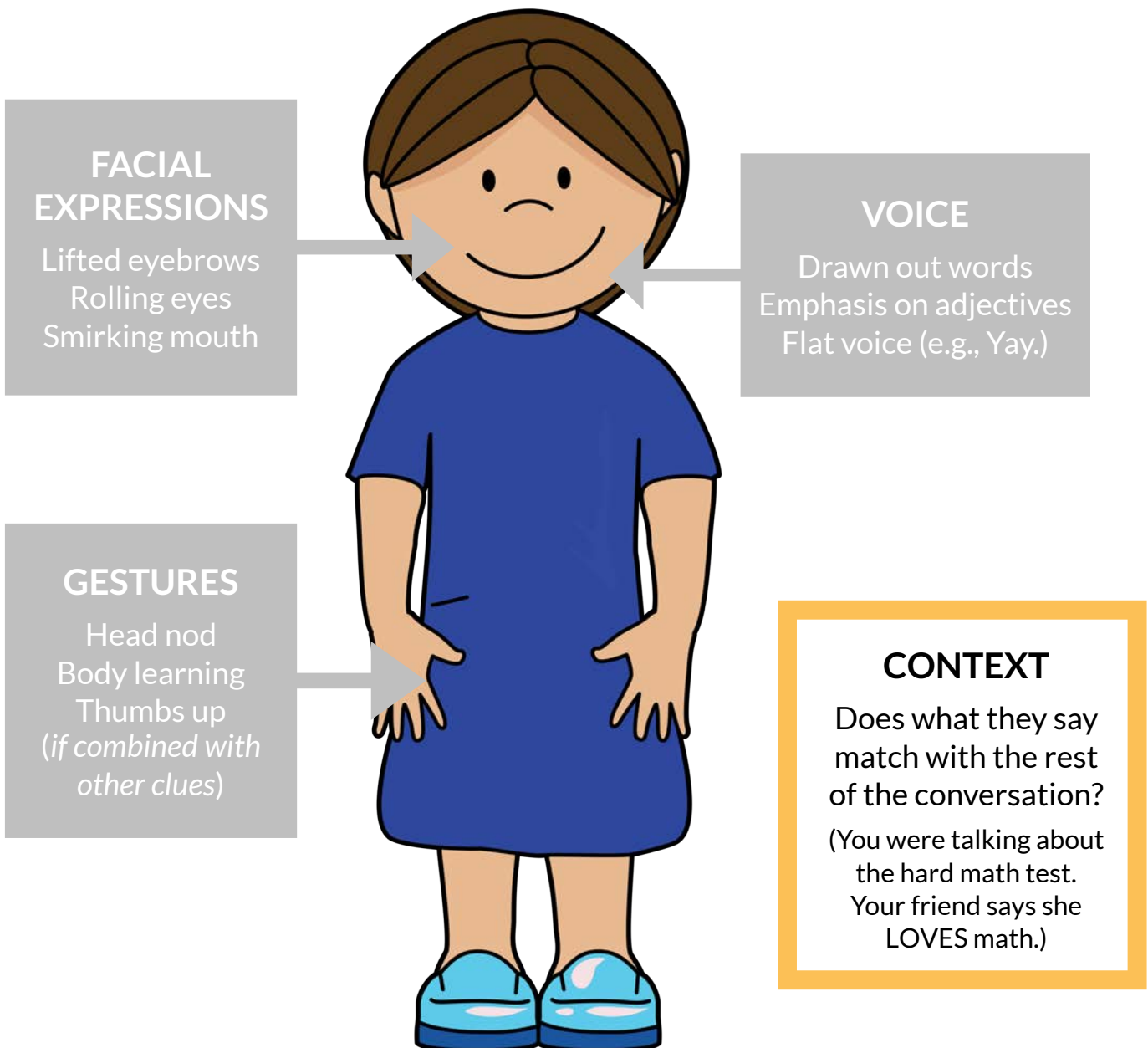
Sarcasm: Teaching Visual

People use sarcasm if they are trying to be funny or if they are annoyed. They might also use it to be mean.



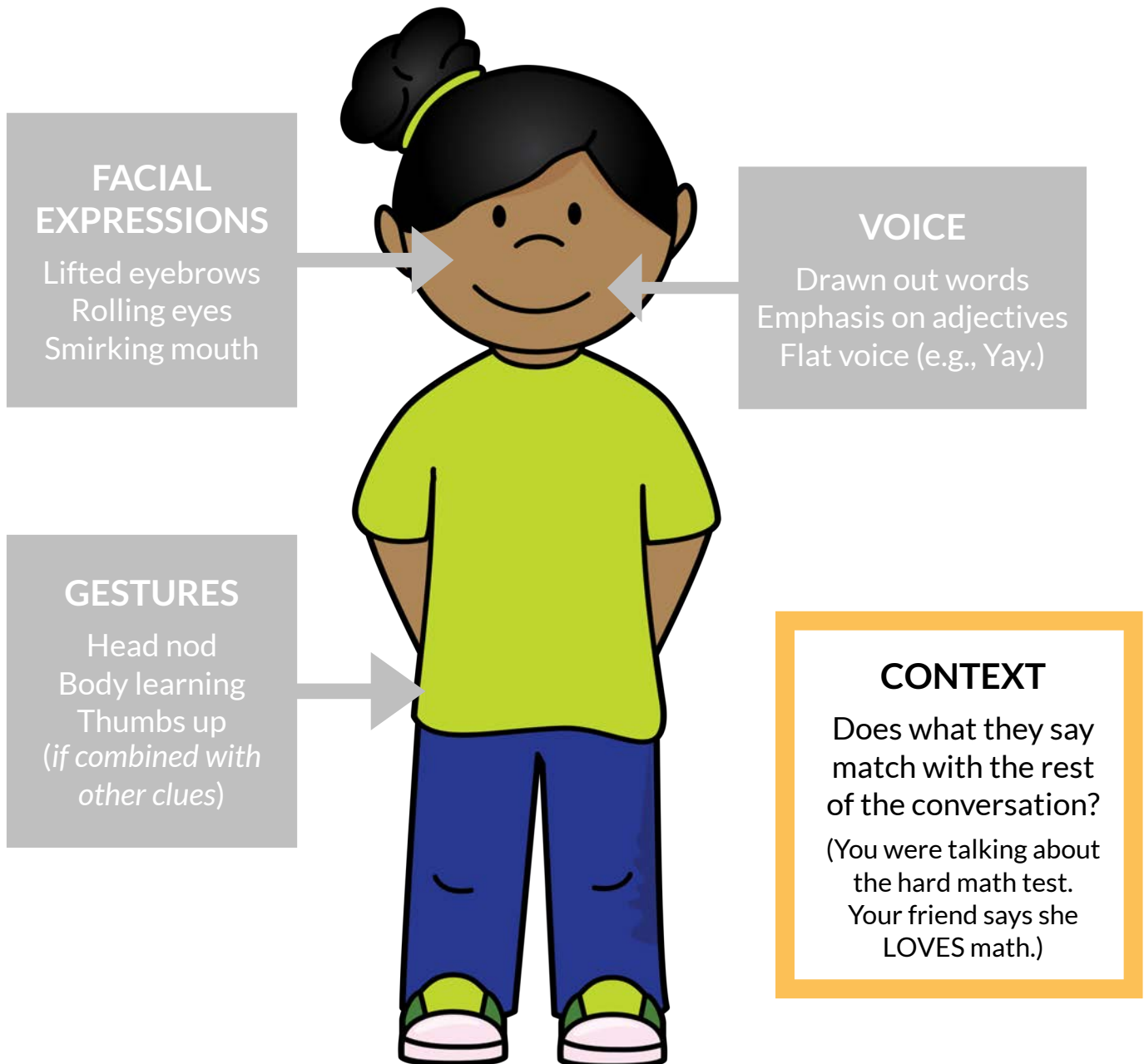
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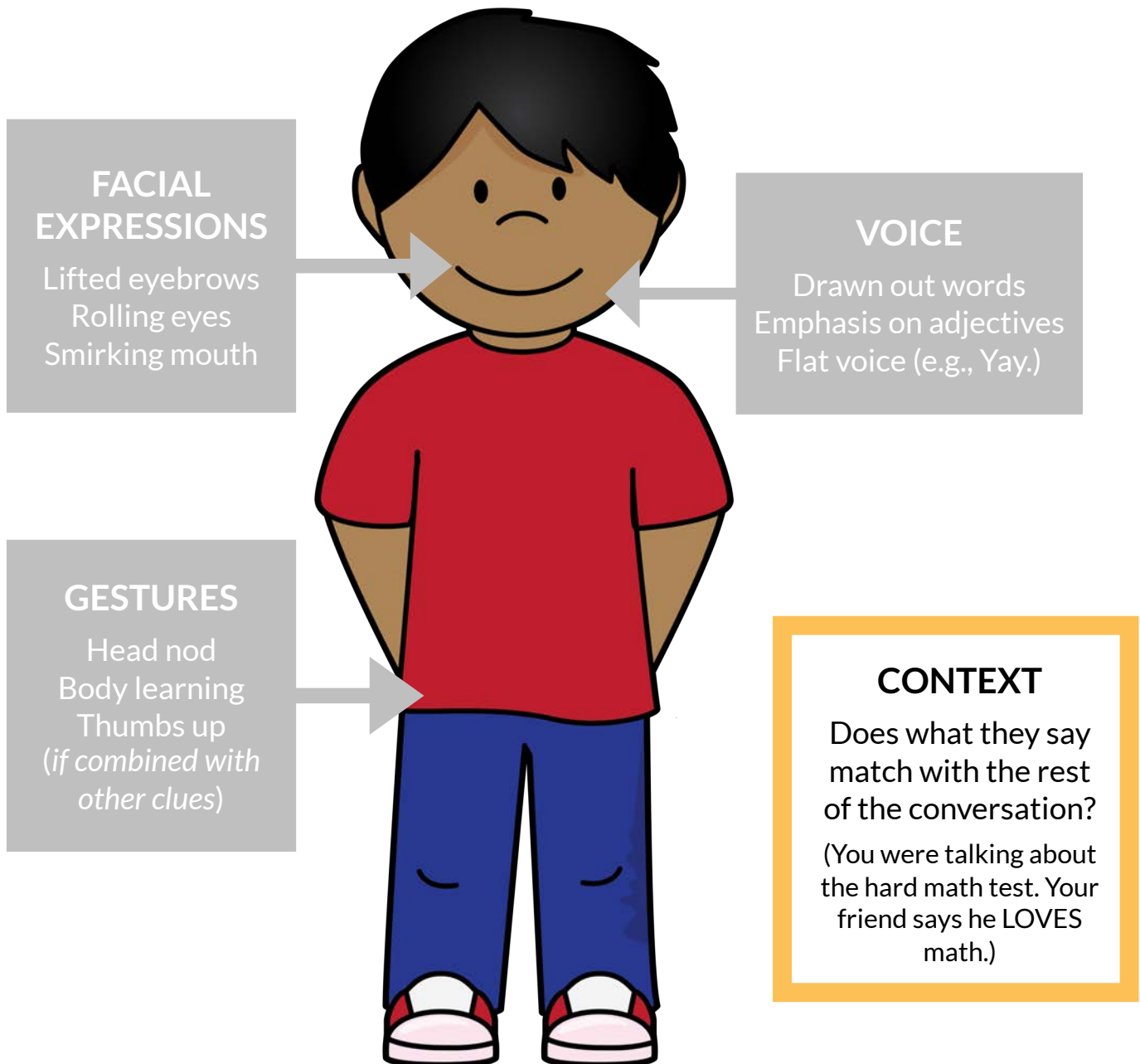
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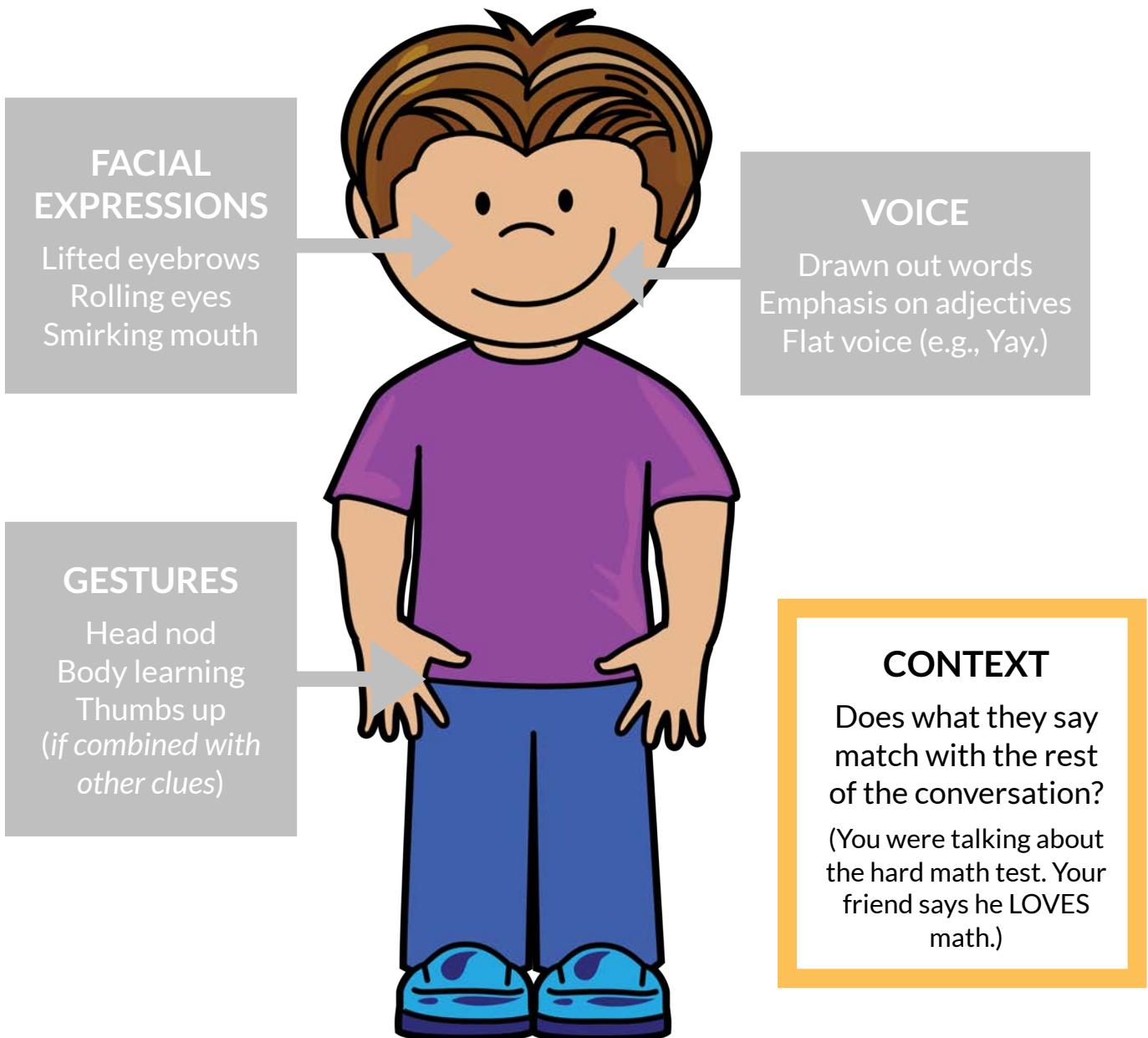
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Sarcasm: Photo Cards
