- Students will identify positive and negative consequences of using bullying to resolve conflict.
- Students will explain how word choice and tone can create misunderstanding and conflict.
- Students will learn how to advocate for themselves and others in bullying situations

Bullying:

- Aggressive & unwanted behavior meant to harm, intimidate, or humiliate someone
- Power is not equal between the aggressor(s) & student
- Repetitively injuring, humiliating, or causing someone to feel uncomfortable
- Includes cyberbullying (bullying online)






Harassment:

- Repeatedly annoying or upsetting someone on purpose
- Behavior may be due to the victim's race, color, religion, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, or disability
- Inappropriate jokes about these thingsis harassment



Sexual Harassment:

- Unwelcome asks for sexual favors
- Unwelcome sexual advances
- Inappropriate sexual jokes
- Consent = asking for permission
- Consent can be taken back at any time, NO means NO



Title IX

- A federal law that protects you from any type of harassment
- Title IX applies to ALL students, regardless of gender identity
- Police can be involved in situations of unwanted touches





Discrimination:

- Treating someone unequally based on their race, color, religion, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, or disability
- Discrimination is against the law in schools and jobs



4 Types of BULLYING

PHYSICAL Bullying

Hitting, kicking, slapping, pinching, spitting, tripping, pushing, blocking

Stealing or destroying someone's possessions

Making mean or rude hand gestures

Touching in unwanted & inappropriate ways



Name calling

Insults

Teasing

Intimidation

Homophobic or racist remarks

Inappropriate sexual comments

Taunting

Threatening to cause harm



Lying & spreading rumors

Leaving someone out on purpose

Telling others not to be friends with someone

Embarrassing someone in public

Damaging someone's social reputation or relationships



Posting/sending hurtful texts emails or posts, images or videos

Making online threats

Imitating others online or using their log-in

Deliberately excluding others online

Spreading nasty gossip or rumors



How can I help? Be an UPSTANDER!

STOP BULLYING be an upstander

Upstander

- Helping a friend who is being bullied
- Taking action when you see or hear someone being bullied or harassed
- Reporting inappropriate comments or behaviors to your school counselor or administrator
- Asking someone if they are okay after they have been teased or harmed

Bystander

- Watching someone being bullied without helping
- Laughing or recording when someone is being harmed
- Observing bullying and acting as if it's none of their business
- Ignoring someone's pain or someone being mistreated

Scenarios

On the next slides, we will discuss fictional scenarios that cover bullying and harassment in insensitive ways. These situations are based on harmful and untrue stereotypes and should not be repeated towards other individuals.

If you are uncomfortable listening to a scenario please take a break by laying your head down or going to get some water.

Cindy started at her new school in January. She is very nervous since everyone has already made their friends. When she arrived at school, she had trouble fitting in since she does not dress or talk like the other kids. Some of your friends have been laughing behind her back.

Questions:What would you do?

How can you help new students and show them kindness?

How did you feel being the new person in your school?

The boys in Andy's class have a funny joke going where they slap each other's butt. Andy's teacher has asked them to stop, but the students continue to do it. At lunch time, Andy slapped one of the girl's butt. She ran away crying. Andy felt confused because the boys thought this joke was funny.

Questions:

Who can this behavior be reported to?

How would you define the boy's behavior?

In what cases is it okay to touch someone else?

Katie broke her leg in PE class and now has to wear a cast on her leg with crutches. Some of the girls in PE have been taking her crutches and telling her to hop and get it. They are also calling her crippled Kate. She now notices that students in her other classes are calling her this offensive name.

Questions:

How can you help Katie?

Who can you report their behavior to?

What should Katie do?

How do you think Katie feels?

Jim has been feeling uncomfortable in her body, and has told a couple of her close friends that she would like to go by she/her pronouns. She asked her friends to keep this a secret. One of her friends posted it on social media, and now others are teasing Jim and threatening to tell her parents if she does not do things for them.

Questions:

How would you define the kid's behavior?

What should Jim's friends have done when Jim told them her preferred pronouns?

How can her friends move forward and help better the situation?

Jason is the only African American boy in his new class, and he is very nervous to fit in. When the class was watching a video, one of his friends said 'Hey look Jason, he's a n* just like you.' Jason smiled and nodded, but felt very uncomfortable. He didn't want to lose his friend, so he ignored

Questions:

How would you define his friend's comment?

How can Jason or a nearby friend respond in this moment?

How do you think Jason feels after this comment?

When is it okay to say the 'n' word?

How does being bullied affect someone?

Isolated

Grades can drop

Self-Harm & Depression
